

## Cheryl Taylor Selected as NLN-Appointed Consultant to NSNA

The National Student Nurses' Association is pleased to announce the appointment of Cheryl Taylor, PhD, RN, as the National League for Nursing (NLN)-appointed consultant to NSNA. Dr. Taylor is stepping into the appointment as Dr. Carol-Grace Toussie Weingarten, PhD, RN, ends her term in the role. During her two-year appointment, Dr. Taylor will serve in an advisory capacity to the Board of Directors during their business meetings. She will fulfill this role along with Cheryl K. Schmidt, PhD, RN, CNE, ANEF, the American Nurses Association (ANA)-appointed consultant, who stepped in as a consultant last year.

Upon receiving her BSN from Dillard University in New Orleans, Dr. Taylor was recruited by the University of Washington Seattle Masters in Nursing Program. She earned a PhD in Nursing from Texas Woman's University in Denton, Texas, where she also guided student development as a Residence Hall Director. She concentrated her doctoral research on the interplay of homelessness and chronic mental illness. Later, as a health policy intern, her research findings were cited in the U.S. Congressional Record. She was also the principal investigator on a seven-year community based participatory research program to reduce cardiovascular health disparities. A self-described lifelong learner, Taylor spent the past three decades mentoring nursing students, participating in health organizations and creating partnerships. She serves on the faculty of the Southern University of Baton
